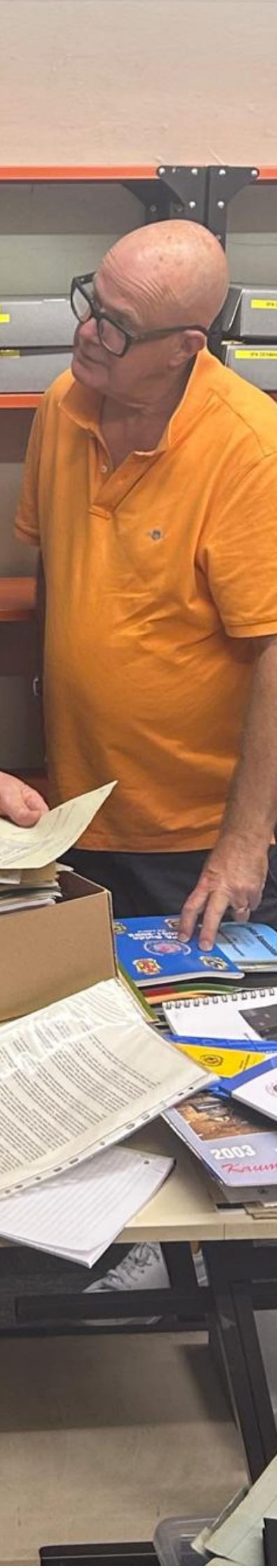
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Foreward

Letter of Appreciation to the IPA for the 2026 Arthur Troop Scholarship

I was honored to be awarded the Arthur Troop Scholarship (ATS) 2026 by the International Police Association (IPA), an opportunity that enabled me to participate in the Hostile Environment Awareness Training (HEAT) Course, conducted by the Hellenic Multinational Peace Support Operations Training Centre (MPSOTC) in Greece, from the period of 5 days. The scholarship provided an excellent opportunity for professional development and international cooperation, bringing together participants from different backgrounds and places around the world with a common objective: enhancing their ability to operate safely and effectively in hostile and high-risk environments.



From the very beginning, the training combined theoretical instruction with practical exercises, creating an intensive and highly interactive learning environment. Throughout the week, all participants were introduced to a broad range of topics related to personal security, field communications, navigation and orientation, emergency medical response, convoy security procedures, threat awareness, and survival techniques in challenging operational conditions. A significant part of the programme focused on understanding and recognizing threats that personnel may encounter during international deployments/mission. Through presentations, discussions and scenario-based training,



I developed a greater awareness of personal security measures, risk assessment processes and decision-making under pressure. The course also addressed issues such as checkpoint procedures, vehicle movement in hostile environments, hostage survival, and the identification of explosive threats and other security hazards.



One of the most valuable aspects of the training was the extensive practical component. Realistic field exercises challenged participants to apply the knowledge acquired in the classroom while operating as part of a team. These scenarios required effective communication, situational awareness, adaptability and leadership, while reinforcing the importance of preparation and cooperation in complex environments. The practical nature of the course, created a realistic learning experience and highlighted the value of maintaining composure and professionalism under stressful conditions. In addition to the operational and security-related modules, the course provided valuable medical training, including emergency lifesaving interventions and casualty management. I was given the opportunity to practice essential first-response skills and gain confidence in providing immediate assistance during critical incidents. These skills are not only relevant for international missions but are equally valuable in everyday professional duties.

Equally important was the opportunity to meet and exchange experiences with participants from different professional and cultural backgrounds. The international nature of the course encouraged open discussion, the sharing of best practices and the development of professional networks. Learning from the experiences of others broadened my perspective and reinforced the importance of cooperation in addressing contemporary security challenges.

The HEAT course was both demanding and rewarding. It strengthened my confidence, enhanced my understanding of risk management and improved my ability to respond effectively in uncertain and potentially dangerous situations. The combination of theoretical knowledge, practical application and international cooperation made this training an exceptionally valuable professional experience. I return from this experience with new skills, greater awareness, and a deeper appreciation of the importance of preparation, resilience and teamwork. The knowledge and practical lessons gained during the course will undoubtedly contribute to my future professional responsibilities and operational effectiveness.

I would like to express my sincere gratitude to the IPA and the Arthur Troop Scholarship Programme 2026, for making this opportunity possible. Beyond the professional benefits, the scholarship provided the chance to build new friendships, exchange knowledge with colleagues from different backgrounds and strengthen the spirit of international cooperation that lies at the heart of IPA. It was a memorable and enriching experience that I will carry forward throughout my professional career, truly reflecting the IPA motto

"Servo per Amikeco-Service Through Friendship".

A Family Experience at Gimborn

When my wife Kathryn and I were selected to attend the Empowering Women in Policing seminar at IBZ Schloss Gimborn in Germany, we were excited by the opportunity. As two women working within policing, the chance to spend a week learning alongside colleagues from twenty-five different countries was not something that comes around often.



There was just one challenge: our now two-year-old son, Nikolai.

Like many working parents, particularly those working in policing, attending conferences and development opportunities often involves far more planning than simply booking a flight. Childcare, routines, family commitments, and the logistics of being away from home all have to be carefully considered. In our case, the solution came in the form of an extra travelling companion: my mum, Nikolai's grandmother.

Together, the four of us travelled to Germany, with my mum taking on childcare responsibilities during the day while my wife and I attended the seminar. It was a decision that allowed us both to take part in a valuable professional development opportunity whilst also ensuring that Nikolai remained close by and cared for by someone he knew and trusted.

What we quickly discovered was that Gimborn was far more accommodating to families than we had expected.

Although Gimborn is first and foremost a professional learning environment, we never felt that our family was an inconvenience. Before we even arrived, staff worked with us to arrange suitable family accommodation, ensuring that all four of us could stay comfortably on site



Seminar Reflections from, IBZ Gimborn – A family Perspective

12–17 April 2026

Throughout the week, my mum was welcomed as part of the wider Gimborn community, and Nikolai quickly became a familiar face at mealtimes, where staff and delegates alike greeted him with smiles and conversation.

What stood out was not simply that these arrangements were possible, but the attitude with which they were made. Nothing ever felt like a burden or a special request. Instead, there was a genuine understanding that supporting delegates sometimes means supporting the people who support them. In particular, we would like to thank Ulrike, whose kindness, flexibility, and willingness to help made a real difference to our experience. By making space for our family, Gimborn enabled both my wife and I to participate fully in the seminar whilst knowing that our son and his grandmother were comfortable, included, and nearby.

Their kindness reflected many of the values discussed throughout the seminar itself: inclusion, support, and recognising the whole person behind the professional role.



Nestled amongst forests and rolling countryside, Schloss Gimborn is an impressive setting in its own right. The historic castle provides a unique backdrop for international learning, bringing together police officers and staff from across the world. Yet despite hosting professional seminars, there was warmth and informality to the environment that made our family feel welcome from the moment we arrived.

Whilst we attended workshops and discussions during the day, my mum and Nikolai spent their time exploring the castle grounds and surrounding area. The extensive outdoor space, wildlife, and woodland walks provided plenty of opportunities for a curious toddler to burn off energy and discover new things. The setting felt safe, peaceful, and far removed from the pressures of everyday life.

One of the unexpected joys of the week was how quickly Nikolai became known to delegates and staff. Whether it was a wave across the dining hall, a smile from someone passing in the corridor, or conversations sparked over mealtimes, he seemed to bring people together in a way that transcended language and nationality.

For us, this reflected one of the strongest themes of the seminar itself.

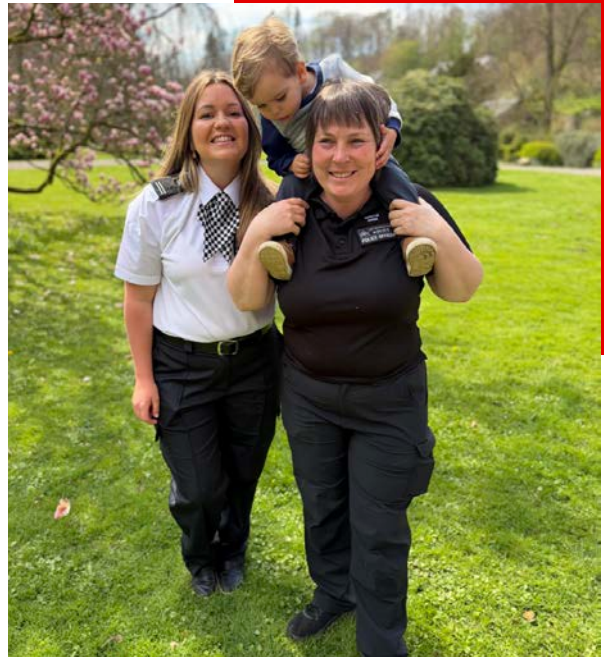
Throughout the week, women shared honest conversations about leadership, career progression, confidence, family responsibilities, and the realities of balancing demanding careers with life outside work. While the seminar focused on empowering women in policing, many discussions inevitably returned to the challenge of managing both professional ambition and family life.

Having three generations of our family present at Gimborn brought those conversations to life in a very practical way.

Looking back, some of our favourite memories are not of any single seminar session but of the experience as a whole. They are the conversations that continued long after the formal programme had ended, the sharing of ideas and experiences with colleagues from around the world, and the friendships formed during meals and evening events. Perhaps most importantly, they are the memories of knowing that whilst we were investing in our professional development, our family was able to be part of the journey too.

Gimborn gave us the opportunity to learn, network, and build international friendships. It also demonstrated that, with the right support, professional development and family life do not always have to exist in separate worlds. For our family, it became much more



than a conference. It became a shared experience and a reminder that behind every professional achievement is often a network of support that deserves recognition, too.

Future Meets Friendship

When fifty-two young police officers from thirty-one nations gathered in the German federal state of North Rhine-Westphalia for a week, it was never just about the training content. It was about what happens when people from five continents meet – and realize just how much they have in common.

Fifteen years ago, Philipp Kurz himself sat in that very circle – young, curious, and full of expectations. In 2011, he took part in the very first IPA YPOS in Amsterdam. What he experienced there shaped him: encounters with colleagues from countries his official duties would never have otherwise taken him to. Friendships that lasted. In August 2026, he stood on the other side. Not as a participant, but as a host. As President of IPA Germany, he welcomed fifty-two young police officers from thirty-one nations to the Selm-Bork Education Center. The circle had closed.



Arriving in Selm-Bork

The week began with a feeling many of the arrivals knew well: that mix of excitement and anticipation when you step into a place you have never been before, yet meet people you will soon call friends. Markus Henkel, Head of the LAFP NRW, and Philipp Kurz, President of IPA Germany, welcomed the group – and immediately sensed: the chemistry here is right.

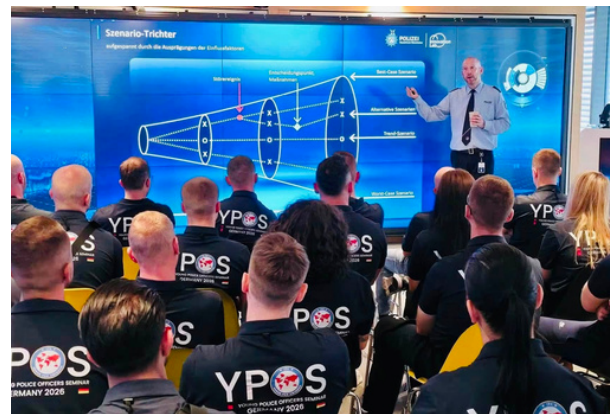
A guided tour of the LAFP NRW grounds provided initial insights into the training and exercise areas, including the shooting range. Afterwards, the focus shifted to the IPA itself: national and international structures, commissions, projects, and the international strategy of the association. Those who were new quickly understood: the IPA is more than just a network. It is an infrastructure for connection.

The formal part of the day concluded with a joint sports activity. During the evening BBQ at the IPA House Selm-Bork, conversations flowed freely – about home countries, about the path to joining the police, and about expectations for the week ahead.



When the Future Enters Training

"Future Meets Training – Digitalisation in Police Operational Training" was the guiding theme. Not an abstract buzzword, but a promise that ran through the entire week. The question hanging in the air was: How are digitalization, new technologies, and innovative training methods changing police work – and above all, the way the next generation is trained?



Answers were provided at the Innovation Lab of the LZPD NRW in Duisburg. The digital strategy of the NRW Police was presented in a way that made the topic itself experiential: the lecture was translated live by a self-developed artificial intelligence. A robot dog demonstrated where technical systems can already provide operational support today.

That looking to the future does not mean throwing proven methods overboard was shown elsewhere. In the practical workshop on tactical handcuffing, instructors taught modern techniques step by step. In the VR workshop, participants tried out the use of Tasers and firearms in a virtual environment – realistic enough to learn from, yet safe enough to allow for mistakes. This was exactly the point: experiencing innovation without losing sight of practical reality.

Police Work Up Close

Anyone who spent the week in Selm-Bork didn't just have police work explained to them; they experienced it with all their senses. At the Bochum Police Headquarters, the focus was on the Riot Police, the Technical Operations Unit, and the Water Cannon Unit. The international guests were invited to get actively involved: acting as "disruptors" in a riot police exercise, they experienced first-hand what operational dynamics truly mean. They also experienced the water cannon first-hand: one group got to sit in front of the vehicle and was thoroughly soaked. The State Mounted Police Unit also demonstrated how tradition and modernity work together, allowing participants to act as disruptors in one of their exercises.

At the Federal Police Directorate in Sankt Augustin, the group visited specialized operational areas including the Evidence and Arrest Unit. The actual highlight, however, literally came from above: a Federal Police helicopter landed – and the group was allowed not only to inspect it but also to climb inside.



In Düsseldorf, the focus was finally on operational reality in an urban environment. The exchange on the specific challenges and concepts for managing police operations in the Düsseldorf Old Town provided ample material for lively discussions – the colleagues from their home countries knew all too well the similar problems they face. In the evening, the day wound down in a traditional brewery, where conversations relaxed over discussions of operations, families, and the future of the IPA.

Europe in Dialogue

That police work no longer ends at national borders was demonstrated in the dialogue with Member of the European Parliament Lena Düpont. Under the guiding theme "Future Policing in Europe – Opportunities and Challenges for the Next Generation of Police Officers," the young police officers actively joined the discussion. It was an exchange on equal footing – and a sign that the next generation of European policing is already thinking across borders today.

When Colleagues Become Friends

What truly makes a YPOS cannot be measured in agenda items. It is the moments in between.

The International Evening, for example: an evening where each nation presented its culinary specialties and cultural quirks. And then there was that one moment when the patch trading began – an exchange of badges as a sign of solidarity, as a memento of encounters that will last. These patches now adorn the memory walls of colleagues around the globe.



A very unique, almost symbolic highlight was the tree-planting event. IPA Selm-Bork has always invited every nation visiting the LAFP Selm-Bork for the first time to plant their own tree – permanently marked with the flag of the respective country. And so, a small, colorful forest of flags grew that day, each one a quiet testament: We were here, and we belong. While planting, the participants encountered another group of IPA members who were visiting Selm-Bork for Friendship Week. Among them, some of the young police officers suddenly recognized their own compatriots – and within minutes, casual glances turned into conversations, and conversations into connections.

Encounters like these resonated far beyond the week. Even before departing, some participants had already made concrete plans to visit each other in their home countries in the coming weeks. What started as a week in North Rhine-Westphalia became the next chapters of a friendship that continues to be written across borders.

The day in Münster also belonged to those moments that matter, even if they aren't on the training schedule: a reception in the Historical Peace Hall of the Town Hall by the Deputy Mayor, a double-decker bus city tour, free time to explore independently, and a shared inner. Conversations that drifted away from duty and the official program.

It was exactly these moments that made YPOS 2026 so much more than a standard training event.

What Remains

At the official closing ceremony, certificates of participation were handed out. But what truly mattered was not written on any certificate.

Hanna from Finland summed it up perfectly: "Thank you all for this amazing week. Honestly, this has been the best trip abroad of my entire life, because everything was organized so well – the food, the activities and especially this community. There is no other work environment where you get the chance to meet new people from such a wide range of cultures."

Muhammad from Pakistan added: "I learned a lot from each of you, not only professionally but also through the friendships, experiences, and connections we shared." Brian from the USA was certain: "I know we all made memories we will never forget and friends that will last a lifetime." And Laura from Germany summarized what everyone was likely feeling: "It was such a wonderful time, filled with great conversations, valuable exchanges, and most importantly, new friendships." Fifty-two participants. Thirty-one nations. Five continents. One police family.



YPOS 2026 has shown that international friendship and professional exchange are not abstract goals of the IPA. They are actively lived by the next generation – in every encounter, in every conversation held across borders. The personal contacts formed this week can endure for many years and form a vital foundation for trust and cross-border cooperation.

What Philipp Kurz began in Amsterdam in 2011 was continued in Selm-Bork in 2026. Not as a repetition, but as a confirmation: when you bring young people together, when you give them space for professional exchange and personal encounters, something is created that carries on long after the week is over. Trust. Understanding. Friendship. *Servo per amikeco. Serve through friendship.* In Selm-Bork, this phrase was not just thought about for a week. It was lived.

An activity that for centuries has contributed to people's knowledge and enjoyment. At IPA, we cannot remain on the sidelines of any cultural phenomenon, especially since, as has been demonstrated, we have many members who are passionate about writing and, moreover, about doing it well.

As all members of our association who are passionate about cultural matters know, for several years we have been organizing competitions in different areas of this field, such as photography, children's drawings, videos, and occasionally painting. But until now, none related to literature had been organized. This year, for the first time, it has been done. At the beginning of the year, the call for entries with the rules was sent out, and at the end of July, the deadline for submitting works was reached.

And we can announce with satisfaction that we have received a fantastic response. Twenty authors participated, submitting a total of 25 works across the four categories of the competition: professional short stories, open short stories, professional poems, and open poems. The authors come from 12 different countries across 5 continents: Belgium, Botswana, Colombia, Lithuania, Poland, Romania, Russia, Slovenia, Spain, Sri Lanka, the United Kingdom, and the USA.

All the works, most of which are of a high literary standard, have been evaluated by a jury chaired by the Arts and Culture project leader, author of this article, and are being compiled for publication as an anthology. The results of the competition will be announced during the next world congress, and the published book will be distributed to all delegates from the sections attending the congress. Copies will also be given to the winning authors from their respective countries, along with a diploma and a commemorative gift. We hope that this initiative, so important to the culture of our association, will continue and that in the coming years the competition will be repeated and we will have even greater participation.

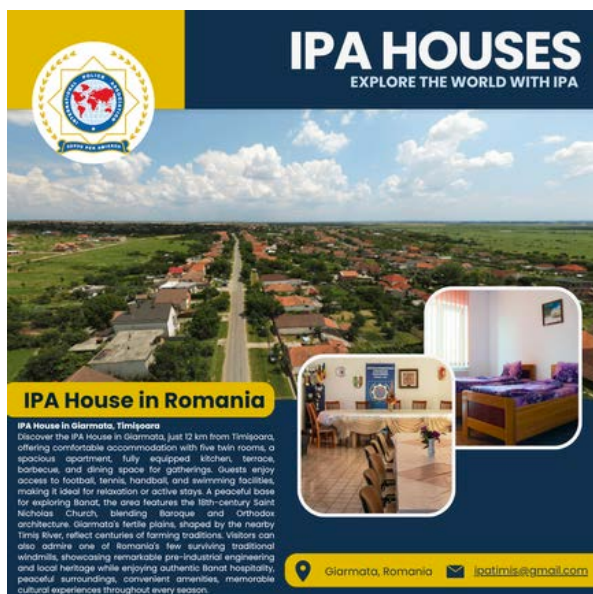

Bouillabaisse (pronounced "BOO-ya-bess")

is a classic, traditional Provençal fish stew originating from the port city of Marseille,



Ingredients:

Serves 6.

SAUCE

Rock fish: 1.0 kg, Onion: 1 piece, Head of garlic: 2 pieces, Olive oil: 10 cl,

Saffron pistils: 2.0 pinches, Olive oil: 25 cl, Strong mustard: 1 tablespoon

Leek: 2 pieces, Tomato: 4 pieces, Laurier: 2 f, Dried fennel branch: 1 piece

Cayenne pepper: 0.2 g, Egg yolk: 2 pieces, Garlic cloves: 2 cloves

FOR THE REST OF THE RECIPE

Ground apples with melting flesh: 6 pieces,

Living: 4 pieces, Congress: 800 g, Salt: 0.5 g,

Saint Pierre: 1.2 kg, Collared Fish: 800g, Fine salt: 6 pinches, Pepper mill: 3 turns

Method:

Fish Soup Base

Do not remove the skin from the rock fish. Clean them carefully, gut the larger fish and rinse well.

Clean the leeks and cut them into large pieces. Peel and roughly chop the onions. Peel and lightly crush the garlic cloves. Wash the parsley and fennel thoroughly and let them drain. Crush the tomatoes by hand or with a utensil.

Heat olive oil gently in a large pot. Add the prepared vegetables together with the bay leaf, orange zest and chilli. Cook slowly over low heat for about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally.

Add the rock fish to the pot, season with salt and pepper, and let everything simmer gently so the flavours can develop. After about 15 minutes, pour in approximately 3 litres of boiling water.

Continue cooking over low heat for another 10 minutes.

Remove the fennel stalks and the orange peel. Mash the remaining contents using a coarse masher, then strain the mixture through a fine sieve or chinois to obtain a smooth soup base.

Add saffron, adjust seasoning if needed, and set the soup aside.

Sauce & Croutons

Peel two garlic cloves, remove the germ and finely chop them.

Place the mustard and egg yolks in a bowl and mix until smooth. Add the garlic, then slowly whisk in about 25 cl of olive oil until a thick sauce forms. Keep refrigerated until serving.

Preheat the oven grill. Slice the bread thinly and brush lightly with olive oil. Toast the slices on both sides until golden. Once removed from the oven, rub the warm croutons with a peeled garlic clove.

Final Steps

Clean and gut the remaining fish, then cut them into evenly sized pieces.

Peel the potatoes, wash them and cut into cubes. Cook them in a pot for about 30 minutes, covered with an equal mix of fish stock and water. Season with salt, then set aside.

Bring the remaining fish stock to a gentle boil. Add the fish pieces, starting with those that have firmer flesh, and poach over low heat for 6–10 minutes.

Arrange the cooked potatoes on a large serving dish and place the fish pieces on top. Place the garlic croutons in a soup bowl and pour the hot bouillabaisse over them. Serve the soup alongside the fish and potatoes.

4. Assemble the Story

The generated clips were then arranged in the correct sequence within Google Vids to create a clear and engaging story.

5. Generate the AI Voiceover

Using the prepared script, Google Vids generated an AI voiceover for each 5-second scene.

This ensured the narration aligned perfectly with each visual while maintaining a professional, friendly and consistent tone throughout the video.

6. Add Captions and On-Screen Text

Captions and text overlays were also generated and refined within Google Vids, improving accessibility and making the video easier to follow—particularly for viewers watching on social media with the sound turned off.

7. Finish with Background Music

Finally, a subtle mid-tempo music track was added to provide energy and pace without distracting from the narration.

31st IPA Mediterranean Meeting Held in Berat



from 4–7 June 2026, the 31st Meeting of the IPA Mediterranean Sections was successfully held in Albania, specifically in the city of Berat.

The Mediterranean region is one of the most visited tourist destinations in the world. Millions of citizens travel between our countries every year, contributing to economic development, cultural exchange, and international friendship. However, alongside this movement, real security challenges arise, including the loss of travel documents, incidents, language barriers, emergency situations, and difficulties in accessing local support structures. Therefore, an event focused on “Security and Tourism” contributes significantly to strengthening inter-institutional cooperation and promoting the image of IPA as a key factor in the development of efficient and safe tourism.

The IPA Albania Section attached great importance to this event and, starting in January 2026, held a series of meetings with IPA structures, senior representatives of the State Police, the local police authorities of Berat and Fier, as well as representatives of the hospitality and tourism business sector.

Regular communication was maintained with all delegations through e-mail correspondence and telephone contacts. We also carefully defined responsibilities concerning reception at Tirana International Airport, facilitation of expedited border-crossing procedures, accommodation arrangements, and the successful organization of tourist tours for all participants.

Representatives from the IPA Sections of Albania, Montenegro, Greece, Croatia, Serbia, Slovenia, North Macedonia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Gibraltar, Italy, Romania, Israel, Portugal, Cyprus, Moldova, Ukraine, Türkiye, Malta, and .

Switzerland participated in the meeting. Mr. Christo Parginos attended on behalf of the IEB. Despite prior communications, the Spanish Section, contrary to our expectations, did not attend the meeting

The official assembly was held at the "Colombo" Hotel, where all delegates were accommodated. The meeting was attended by and included contributions from the Deputy Minister of Tourism, representatives of the Municipality of Berat, and the Director of the Berat Regional Police Directorate.

During the meeting, several ideas were presented regarding support for tourism through the concept of the IPA Alert Number 24/7.

This number would not replace national emergency numbers but would complement existing services by providing guidance, mediation, and initial assistance, while ensuring a reliable point of contact for tourists.

The service would be managed by IPA Sections and would operate through communication channels with local and national police authorities, as well as a support structure for administrative and non-emergency situations, particularly cases involving the loss or theft of travel documents, one of the most common and stressful problems faced by tourists

Organizational Structure

Each IPA Section would establish an IPA Alert National Unit, composed of trained IPA volunteer members operating on a 24/7 basis as national or regional coordinators.

31st IPA Mediterranean Meeting Held in Berat

The technical infrastructure would be simple and consist of:

A dedicated national or regional telephone number;

- A digital communication platform;

- An electronic case-reporting register.

For this purpose, a common IPA standard for data protection would be established.

Basic Operating Procedure

1. The tourist contacts the IPA Alert Number;

2. The IPA operator identifies the case and provides immediate assistance (information and guidance);

3. The operator mediates contact with the local police and, in cases involving lost documents, directs the tourist to the relevant embassy or consulate while facilitating communication with border authorities where necessary.

Funding, Self-Financing and the Role of Insurance Companies

A key element for the long-term operation of the IPA Alert 24/7 Number is financial sustainability and the involvement of insurance companies as strategic partners.

This model creates a functional security chain: Tourist – IPA – Police – Insurance Company thereby ensuring efficiency, rapid response, and reliability.

This project, briefly presented here, forms part of a broader vision aimed at increasing trust, strengthening the image of our countries, and placing IPA at the centre of police and tourism diplomacy.

During their stay, delegates participated in highly successful guided tours in the cities of Berat and Lushnjë.

European Police Shooting Competition

From one IPA event to the next — off to Aix-en-Provence!

Following a particularly successful friendship week, organised by IPA Département 30 Gard in Villeneuve-lès-Avignon, I continued my journey on 1 June. I took the TGV to Aix-en-Provence, where the European Police Shooting Contest for police and customs personnel was being held for the second time on 3 and 4 June 2026.

On arrival, I was met at the station by Fabrice Couplet, vice-chairman of IPA France and the driving force behind the organisation. He took me straight to the Provence Shooting Club. The entrance to the grounds is situated almost directly opposite the Aix-en-Provence TGV station, but is surprisingly well hidden within a vast nature reserve.

This year, there were set to be more Belgian participants than at the first edition. I had therefore decided to follow our compatriots during their shooting sessions, take photographs and, of course, get to know them better.



An impressive shooting range

The Provence Shooting Club boasts a site covering no less than fourteen hectares, with more than fifteen very diverse outdoor shooting ranges. One of these offers shooting distances of up to 250 metres. Various police and customs services also come here to carry out their regular and compulsory training.

The site also features a cosily furnished clubhouse with a particularly lovely bar which, to be honest, I was immediately a little envious of, and a small shop selling T-shirts and other accessories, amongst other things. The facilities are also set to be expanded further. For instance, there are plans to construct a shooting range measuring no less than 1,200 metres.

After meeting the instructors, who came from both the police and customs services, I was welcomed with a delicious pizza. We then drove to the campsite, where I shared a bungalow with Stéphanie: an energetic, warm-hearted and down-to-earth customs officer with a wealth of fascinating work experience. As is often the case amongst colleagues, it didn't take long, of course, before we were swapping stories and experiences from our respective workplaces. We spent the first evening exclusively with the instructors. Everyone had brought a little something to eat, which quickly resulted in a varied and convivial buffet. After a long day's travel and the initial introductions, a good night's sleep was more than welcome.

European Police Shooting Competition

The preparations

On 2 June, we set off early for the shooting range. There wasn't time for a proper breakfast, but croissants, chocolate rolls and strong coffee were waiting for us at the club. This was followed by a technical tour of all the shooting ranges. The briefing was given by Michael, Mika for short, who acted as head monitor during the event. Using tablets and specially developed apps, the participants' results could be recorded immediately. Each station had its own layout and level of difficulty. Some courses featured small metal targets, whilst others had moving targets. Not only precision, but also speed, strategy and a good assessment of the time available were of great importance.

Once each station had been carefully explained and all the monitors knew their positions and tasks, they tested various courses. Around midday, we returned to the campsite for a group barbecue.

At around 5.00 pm, we gathered again at the venue, where the first participants were arriving. Following the group welcome, the opening speech and the introduction of the instructors, the day concluded with a convivial evening meal at the campsite.



The competition can begin

On 3 June, we were once again expected at the shooting range early. Upon our arrival, the participants were walking around, visibly nervous. Some still had to hire a gun, whilst others needed to buy ammunition. After a group tour of the various stands, the moment had finally arrived: the competition could begin.

The participants had been divided into groups beforehand. The Belgian delegation was in Group 11 and consisted of four colleagues from Brussels and two from Antwerp. They formed a team with two participants from Montenegro and two colleagues from the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg. The organisers provided generously filled packed lunches in the afternoon and another barbecue in the evening. What stuck with me most was the friendly rivalry that developed almost immediately among the participants. Strategies were discussed, experiences shared, and colleagues enthusiastically congratulated one another after a strong run. Lots of photos and videos were taken and shared.

Amidst the serious discussions, there was also an awful lot of laughter.

By the end of the first day of competition, the groups had completed eight of the eleven shooting ranges. However, all the walking through the dust, combined with the high temperatures, was starting to take its toll. Tired but satisfied, everyone returned to the campsite. Fortunately, I was able to get a lift each time from my bungalow mate, who had a service vehicle.

On 4 June, the final three shooting ranges had to be completed. In the afternoon, there were also a few extra rounds. The participants had only a limited number of cartridges at their disposal and had to hit all the targets in the shortest possible time. It was a nervewracking task in which every mistake could prove costly.

Afterwards, everyone headed back to the campsite to freshen up for the prize-giving ceremony. That evening, the winners in the various categories were to be announced and the medals awarded. Unfortunately, shortly before the event, the heavens opened completely and the closing night was in danger of literally being washed out. Thanks to the swift and creative action of the organisers, the tents that had previously been set up at the shooting ranges were brought together. This meant that the more than one hundred participants and instructors were still able to enjoy dinner together. After all, there wasn't enough space for that in the clubhouse itself.



An event with a bright future

Over the course of these days, I've had some particularly enjoyable moments, met lots of interesting people, had lovely conversations and, above all, laughed a great deal. This event not only offers a sporting challenge but also perfectly embodies what the IPA stands for: international friendship, professional networking and camaraderie across borders. Moreover, the European Police Shooting Contest appears to be on the cusp of significant growth. During the first edition in 2025, there were around forty participants. By 2026, that number had already risen to over a hundred. Whereas Belgium was represented by three colleagues last year, this year we were present with seven participants and observers. For the 2027 edition, I therefore hope to put together an even larger Belgian delegation, comprising colleagues from the police and armed customs services. Anyone who enjoys shooting sports, professional challenges, international contacts and a good dose of camaraderie should definitely not miss this event.

Israel

Promoting Women's Sports in IPA

The promotion of women's sports in IPA Israel has received a great boost in the past year.

It was started by Adv. Gal Sharon, President of IPA Israel, while she was still international Vice President and Chairperson of the Social and Cultural Commission, mainly in the IPA Games that she initiated and led.

Every police force has plans to promote women and even has rules for retaining women in the police force.

Last year at the World Congress in Krakow I met Phyllis Nolan, who was a member of the PEB and the first female officer in the Irish Police.

Rules are one thing, reality is another. The situation is similar in IPA as well; today there are very few women serving as president of a national section.

It is naive to think that the IPA could have influenced the place of women in the police, but the IPA has a great influence on social activity and sports.

In Israel, the IPA is a partner in all sports events of the police and the prison service, including activities of retirees.

Either as a supporter and assistant or as an initiator.

IPA Israel national board has a sports coordinator who is a member of the presidency.

In his role, he is the coordinator with the police commanders and the prison service, liaison with the training officers in the units, and the initiator of the national activities initiated by IPA. The emphasis on women is on encouraging and supporting the participation of women's groups in sports activities, within the framework of associations, competitions and tournaments in Israel. In all assessments for participation in international IPA activities, preference is given to women's teams. Unfortunately, there are fewer women's teams than men's, and not in all disciplines. There is much more success in individual sports, such as shooting and running.

Promoting Women's Sports in IPA

It is in the individual disciplines that retired female athletes have had great success. In all IPA games to date, the main winners in the races in the older age group have been retired female police officers from Israel.

At the end of July 2026, history was made, a tournament was held only for women's teams in a relatively new field, netball.

The competition was held in northern Israel with the participation of all the district teams of all the Israel Police and Border Guard districts.

The tournament was initiated by member of the national board, Nazia Halavi, who in his police role is the assistant to the Border Guard commander.

For the first time, all the districts, all the training officers, the commanders were mobilized for the mission and for the first time a professional tournament was held exclusively for women

women's teams today have a place of honor,

But the main problem is that there need to be enough women's teams to hold a competition. The games are run according to international rules and procedures, and there are still no mixed teams of men and women. There may be some at the local level, but for international competition, more women's teams are needed.

The Border Guard women's team won first place in the tournament in Israel. Anyone who thinks you have to be a super athlete to participate in these teams is mistaken. All the teams that participated in the tournament included young policewomen, alongside older policewomen. The advantage of IPA is its friendship and partnership, and therefore the promotion of women in sports does not have to be based on talented athletes, but also IPA members who are interested in participating.

In the IPA games, as well as in other IPA championships around the world

Japan

When Alex Williams, an IPA member from the United Kingdom, arrived in Sapporo, northern Japan, on 3 June, Japan became the 32nd country on his round-the-world cycling journey. Having set off from London in September last year, he had travelled through Europe, the Middle East and South Asia before reaching Japan.

During his 48-day journey across Japan, Alex cycled almost 2,000 kilometers from Hokkaido to Yamaguchi before departing from Shimonoseki for Busan, South Korea, on 20 July. His journey was not simply about covering distance. It was also about the friendships he built with IPA Japan members, who welcomed him into their communities and shared their lives and experiences with him.

He also took on one of the toughest physical challenges of his journey in Japan. On 26 June,

as a typhoon approached, he climbed Mount Kita, Japan's second-highest mountain (3,193 meters), despite strong winds and heavy rain, demonstrating the determination that had carried him throughout his journey.

After cycling approximately 1,100 kilometers from Sapporo over two weeks, Alex arrived in Tokyo, an important milestone in his two-year adventure. He prepared for the next stage of his journey by arranging bicycle repairs, purchasing supplies and clothing, and visiting famous landmarks including the Imperial Palace, Tokyo Station and Shinjuku.

Although Alex and I had first met four years earlier during an online IPA seminar, Tokyo was the first place we met in person. Over the years, we have remained in regular contact, sharing our interests in policing, travel and culture, making our meeting in Tokyo particularly memorable.

His first IPA stop after Tokyo was Kanagawa, where Shintaro Mizuno of IPA Kanagawa welcomed Alex into his home. Spending time together gave Alex an opportunity to experience everyday Japanese family life. They shared stories and experiences, strengthening their friendship through their time together.

Continuing west, Alex was warmly welcomed in Shizuoka by Junji Asaba of IPA Shizuoka and another IPA member from the branch. Over dinner, they exchanged stories about policing and discovered many similarities between British and Japanese police officers despite differences in their societies and working environments.

During his stay in Mie, Alex also visited Ise Grand Shrine and enjoyed local food. These experiences showed him that travelling by bicycle was not only about seeing famous places, but also about connecting with local people.

Following a valuable rest day in Mie, Alex continued his journey to Nara, where Toshiro Nakatani of IPA Kyoto welcomed him into his home. He visited Nara Police Station and took part in an English conversation club activity, another example of how friendship and a willingness to communicate can bring people together.



His journey then continued to Tokushima on Shikoku Island, where he was welcomed by Kengo Shimotori, the first IPA member in Shikoku. Their meeting extended the network of IPA friendship to another part of Japan.

2025 Strategic Young Members Conference Member report

Last September, Section UK was proudly represented by Aaron Seeley at the International Police Association's Strategic Young Members' Conference (SYMCM), held at the historic Gimborn Castle in Germany.

The conference brought together younger serving police officers from across the IPA family, with delegates travelling from Belgium, the Netherlands, Germany, Austria, Spain, Ireland, Lithuania, Estonia, Finland, Denmark, Greece and Japan. The event provided a unique opportunity to share ideas, build international friendships and discuss how the IPA can remain relevant and engaging for future generations of police officers.

The primary aim of the conference was to encourage greater participation from younger serving members and to explore innovative ways of ensuring the Association continues to thrive for many years to come.



Over two days, delegates participated in a series of workshops, presentations and discussions focusing on some of the key challenges and opportunities facing the IPA.

One workshop explored how modern digital communication can better engage younger audiences. Delegates discussed the effective use of social media platforms and emerging technologies, including AI tools such as ChatGPT, to help create engaging content capable of reaching the next generation of IPA members.

Another highlight was learning about IPA Ireland's highly successful mentoring programme. Young officers undertake leadership training and gain recognised qualifications before returning to their regions as mentors for newer members. The scheme has already demonstrated significant success in developing future leaders while increasing engagement among younger serving officers.

Delegates also examined ways of expanding the IPA's popular On Patrol programme, providing more opportunities for officers to experience policing in different countries, alongside discussions about professional study visits and international exchanges that continue to strengthen both operational learning and international friendship.

Inspired by the approaches adopted in other countries, Aaron returned to the UK with ideas that could help strengthen engagement with younger members across Section UK. These included the potential development of regional young member representatives feeding into a national liaison structure, improving communication, promoting

opportunities and encouraging greater participation throughout the Association. Such a model could, in time, evolve into a mentoring programme similar to that already established by our colleagues in Ireland.

While the formal programme was both informative and thought-provoking, delegates agreed that some of the most valuable learning came from the informal discussions that continued long into the evenings. Conversations held in the historic surroundings of Gimborn Castle allowed officers from very different policing environments to share experiences, discuss common challenges and discover that, despite differences in culture and geography, the values and responsibilities of policing remain remarkably similar across the world.

These conversations also reinforced one of the IPA's greatest strengths: building genuine friendships between police officers from different countries. The professional relationships established during the conference will undoubtedly lead to future exchanges, collaborative opportunities and lifelong international friendships.

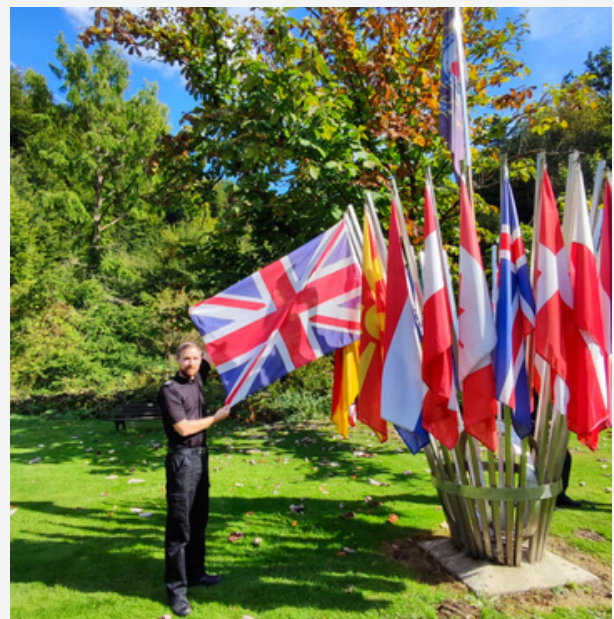

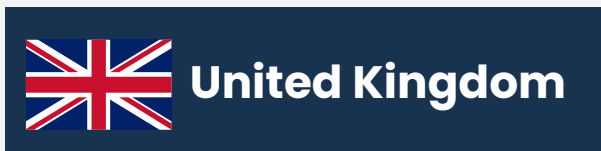

Perth 2027: World Police & Fire Games
